Covid-19 Actions

In order to guarantee to the assisted families the protection of the right to life, liberty, equality, security and property, among others, home visits to families were maintained. Despite the pandemic moment, Santa Fé's team, following the health protocols, made home visits to the 110 families being cared for and ensured, little by little, that the 30 children and adolescents in the Santa Fé Houses would receive visits from their families (one at a time) until December 2021.

Considering the worsening conditions of the families assisted, we have dedicated efforts to ensure food security with the distribution of food baskets, complemented with powdered and whole milk for the children, hygiene kits and cleaning materials to 300 families, benefiting 989 people, being 110 accompanied families and 190 families only with the supply of food baskets, hygiene, and cleaning kits.

There were 90 meetings with 110 families, in groups of approximately five people, to monitor and understand their demands and to develop strategies for care with appropriate interventions and guidance that each situation required, always with the health care determined by the health agencies, as well as contacts for guidance via video and telephone.

The pandemic contributed to the increased vulnerability of families and insecurity in returning to school, although at a distance or through remote means, it was possible to guarantee school support to 112 children, adolescents, and young people, providing them with the opportunity to acquire knowledge, competence and skills that are indispensable to their personal and professional development.

We ensured the supply of the necessary school supplies and also the insertion in online courses, scholarships, including at university, and workshops in art, dance, music, theater, income generation and technology, however it was not possible to ensure the totality of adolescents and young people in vocational courses. Some young people were included in online courses in partnership with RECODE, Empoderamento Digital, SQIP - Serviço de Qualificação e Inclusão Profissional of the Jô Clemente Institute, and ETEC. And young people benefited from the donation of some used computers, donated by private partners, as well as the supply of school materials by Santa Fé.

Facing such complex and plural challenges in relation to health, aggravated by the pandemic period, and aiming at the qualification of strategies and actions directed towards the Health of Children and Adolescents and their families, we work intensely, even in hybrid form, to improve nutritional and environmental conditions, always encouraging breastfeeding, full vaccination coverage, and prenatal care.

In order to make the families aware of the importance of family planning and also of financial planning, we used meetings and discussions, always in small groups for guidance and awareness about the prevention of early pregnancy, contraceptive methods, care with sexual health and STIs - (Sexually Transmitted Infections), and also about the Pandemic and the care with everyone's health, especially the importance of the Covid-19 vaccination, the

use of masks and alcohol gel. There was no lecture held by health professionals due to the pandemic period, but we had the attendance of health professionals for the vaccination of children and teenagers and employees of Santa Fe. We highlight the great impact on the drop in child morbidity.

Considering that everyone suffered from the consequences of social isolation due to the pandemic that contributed to the increase of women and girls' vulnerability, the increase of sexual abuse and domestic violence and, in some cases, resulting in the increase of early pregnancies, the team continued the individual reception in order to identify new cases of domestic violence in the group of families assisted, orienting them and jointly elaborating a service plan, guaranteeing them social,


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


There was an increase in the number of families who sought support in Santa Fé for their members, chemical and alcoholics addicts, whose conditions worsened due to Covid-19, because the consumption of "psychoactive drugs" affects people in different ways, especially the immune system. Thus, the team worked, in small groups, specific themes, with a view to the development of the dependent beneficiaries, the resilience in the psycho-affective aspects and the expansion of the social and educational universe, for their strengthening and family ties, referring them to treatment and psychotherapeutic monitoring in the CAPS of their region of residence, with the accompaniment of Santa Fé


Vision


Guiding Principles

Health

Casa Vovó Ilza

Description:

Program of exclusive housing and integral attention for teenage mothers and their children, the only one in the city/state of São Paulo.

Target audience:

Girls from 11 to 18 years old, pregnant or with children. Most of them are victims of mistreatment and sexual abuse, homeless and using drugs, with no or very tenuous family ties.

Goals:

- Breaking the vicious cycle of misery-violence, present in social and family spaces, as well as preventing the occurrence of new pregnancies and STDs.
- Strengthening of the bond between mother and child.
- Priority is given to the return to the family (nuclear or extended). If reintegration is not possible, it is sought to be directed to an autonomous and emancipated life.
- Return to school and guarantee educational continuity and entry into the job market.
- Guaranteeing the conditions to have custody of the child.

Strategies:

- Acquisition of mothering repertoire.
- Recognition of the identity of the foster mother.
- Individualized therapeutic work for the experience of early motherhood in a constructive and harmonious way for mother and child.
- Provide an environment that contributes to the therapeutic process by breaking the aesthetics of violence.

Main Actions:

- Psychosocial diagnosis Individual Plan of Care.
- Health of the baby since prenatal care, integral maternal health.
- Pre and postpartum guidance and follow-up for mother and baby.
- Reinsertion in school and follow-up (day care for children).
- Family closeness, including the father and the father's family.

- Conducting workshops, cultural, sports and leisure activities.
- Referrals to extracurricular and vocational courses.
- Aid for insertion in the job market.
- Social rights.
- Follow-up on the return home or for emancipation.

Early childhood (0-6 years) is a period rich in possibilities for growth, in which we develop 80% of what we will be in adulthood. Hence the importance of offering children stimuli and follow-ups that ensure a healthy develop-

In view of this, we created a follow-up work of the children's neuropsychomotor development, offering not only a welcoming look, but mainly an intervention focused on the potential and evolution of each child.



Workshops

Language Workshop

After 18 months of online activities, the face-to-face classes were resumed, respecting all protocols, with the use of masks, social distancing, and the use of alcohol gel. The workshops continued to contribute to the process of building the social and cultural identity of each of the participants, and to the development of language, the habit of reading, concentration, development of creativity, expressiveness, logical reasoning, and communication.

Goals

- The child and adolescent perceive themselves as protagonists of their own history.
- Expansion of the cultural repertoire.
- Use the various forms of language to express themselves.

Performed Activities

- Themes: Pandemic; Education for Peace; Inequality; Childhood; Prejudice; Appreciation of Brazilian Culture; Appreciation of Women; Fears and Insecurities; Racism; Xenophobia; Refugees; Back to School.

Results

- Vocabulary expansion.

- Greater willingness to verbalize and narrate facts experienced individually.
- Greater mastery in written narrative considering temporal sequence.
- Greater resourcefulness to retell stories.
- Greater suitability for expressing opinions.
- Being able to relate some of the proposed themes to their own experiences by giving examples.
- Concentration time increased (young children).
- Words are more understandable (young children).

Music Workshop

Goals

- Develop the personality of the child/adolescent as a whole.
- Explore conventional and non-conventional musical instruments.
- Explore sounds produced by the body.

Performed Activities

- Rhythm Studies;
- Experimentation with various percussion and string instruments.
- Repertoire: "Valeu Pequeno" (MC Pequeno and MC Menor), "Asa Branca" (Luiz Gonzaga), "Negro Gato" (Luiz Melodia), "Velha Infância" (Tribalistas), "Yellow Submarine" (The Beatles), "We Will Rock You" (Queen).

Results

- The students acquired the ability to make the new chords proposed above during the lessons.
- After much practice and repetition the students, little by little, acquired the ability to change a chord into another chord.
- The students learned rhythmic accompaniment by developing eighth and sixteenth note divisions.
- Students joined chords to rhythmic accompaniment by playing the songs proposed in class.
- Development of musical perception by recognizing and intoning the notes G A B B D C R E ME
- The students learned to play the accompaniment along with the chords and singing the proposed songs simultaneously.

Theater and Dance Workshop

Goals

- Develop improvisation, speaking, and body expression techniques.
- Develop the self-esteem of children and adolescents.
- Encourage artistic skills.
- Knowledge, expansion, and appreciation of Brazilian cultural aspects and those of other people.

Performed Activities

- Construction of a scenic proposal from conversation wheels.
- Production of scenery and costumes.


